Our last internal fun competition day was the final fling in which 24 members took part. The weather was kind and it was a great day with some quirky ends to tax the mind. It was good to see many of our new members playing on the day. 15 new members have joined this year mainly through the open day which we ran in May. We will be repeating the day again next year.

In the Guildford and Woking Over 55 "Old Codgers" Men's League we came 6^{th} out of 10 in the Guildford section this year, the points between the 2^{nd} and 6^{th} were very close. We held our trophy presentation lunch at the Richard Onslow on the 25th October and 41 members enjoyed the company and celebrated the winners and finalists of our internal competitions.

REMEMBERING ...



Alan Goldsmith

Alan was born in Hailsham, East Sussex, He went to school in Hailsham, played schoolboy football for Hailsham FC and started his life-long passion for the Scouting Movement when he joined 1st Hailsham Scout Group as a Cub Scout in 1944

Alan spent time as an aircraft technician with the RAF. He later took a job as an apprentice mechanical draughtsman with the British Overseas Airways Corporation. Upon completing his apprenticeship he joined Vickers-Armstrong as a civilian aircraft engine draughtsman

Alan spent the remainder of his working life as an industrial chemical salesman – eventually retiring as Southeast England Area Sales Manager.

Alan & Stella began married life at Goring-on-Sea, before moving to Cranleigh in 1968.

Once in Cranleigh, Alan resurrected his passion for the Scout Movement, initially as Scout leader for Vachery troop before becoming Cranleigh Group Scout Leader and then Assistant District Commissioner in charge of Leader Training.


The Scout Association presented Alan with the Silver Acorn award in the 1990s and a Bar to the Silver Acorn in 2000 – both for outstanding services to Scouting. In 2007 Alan received the prestigious Silver Wolf Award (the highest award made by The Scout Association) for exceptional lifetime services to the Scouting Movement.

Alan remained active in the local community too. He was a member of Cranleigh U3A, Ewhurst Bowls Club and several local Bridge Clubs. He was also a Church Warden at St. Nicolas Church.

At the start of 2020, when his wife's dementia deteriorated to the point when she needed 24-hour care, Alan sacrificed all his other pursuits to stay at home and become Stella's full-time carer.

On 2nd April 2023, Alan suffered a massive stroke, and was admitted to the East Surrey Hospital, Redhill. He remained unresponsive for over 19 weeks, before passing away on 16th August (just 10 days after his 85th birthday).

Alan is survived by Stella, their two children (Julia and Roy), two grandchildren (Jennifer and Ryan) and a great granddaughter (Isla).



Tony Riches 1935 - 2023

Tony was born in Whitham, Essex. During the war years Tony's family lived in Suffolk. They often had servicemen as lodgers, and Tony's memories of this time were not of war, but of the kindness and generosity of these servicemen a long way from home, who spoiled them with chocolates and sweets. He later moved to Newcastle where he was educated

at the Royal Grammar School. He later attended King's College in London studying law, graduating in 1957.

He loved playing sport, and it was at a Rugby club dance when he met Ann. There was an instant attraction and he then knew he had met his life partner. Since childhood he was an ardent supporter of Newcastle United. He used to tell stories about how as a child he was carried over the heads of supporters to get to the front of the terrace!

A month after enlisting in the Army Tony was posted to their legal department. With National Service complete, Tony set up his own very successful legal business. He married Ann in May 1960. His son, David, was born in 1963, followed by his daughter, Hilary, in 1965.

Tony played a lot – tennis with his son David, as well as table tennis and backgammon, which they both studied and read books on tactics and strategy. Throughout his life Tony was closely involved in organisations such as Round Table and Rotary. It gave him great pleasure to give something back to the community as well as providing a social outlet through which he made many friends.

When Tony retired in 1998, the family moved to Ewhurst. During these later years he and Ann joined the bowls club. They also indulged in their love of travelling, visiting many exotic places around the world, with a particular love of cruising.

He leaves his son and daughter, and grandchildren Sam, Tim, Sophie and Lucy. He will be greatly missed.
